Dr. Richard Gaillardetz teaches in the College of Arts and Sciences' Religious Studies Program at the University of Toledo, where he holds the Murray/Bacik endowed chair of Catholic Studies. He has published seven books, including *The Church in the Making*, *A Daring Promise: A Spirituality of Marriage*, *Ecclesiology for a Global Church*, and *Teaching with Authority*.

He has received numerous awards from the Catholic Press Association, served on the Board of the Catholic Theological Society, was the Catholic delegate on the U.S. Catholic-Methodist Dialogue (2000-2005), is a past recipient of the Sophia Award from the Washington Theological Union in recognition of a theologian's contribution to the life of the church, and chairs his University's Jewish-Christian-Muslim Dialogue Committee.

His pastoral booklets offer reflections on liturgical, catechetical and pastoral ministry. His articles have appeared in *Theological Studies*, *Origins*, *Commonweal*, *Louvain Studies*, and *National Catholic Reporter*.
